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## **SUPPLY LIST: Beginning Painting: Instructor: Carol Rubin, Winter** term

## Please read thoroughly. There is a lot of detailed information here.

Paint - you may use either oil or acrylic paint in this class\*

Please no "student grade" paint. Look for tubes with "artist's grade" on the label. Paint is significantly cheaper if ordered online.

## **Paint colors**

Small tubes:

vellow ochre,

cadmium yellow light

(cadmium free is available or substitute with cadmium yellow hue )

burnt sienna,

alizarin crimson,

cadmium red (or naphthol red),

burnt umber,

raw umber,

ultramarine blue,

cerulean blue (ok to substitute with cerulean blue hue),

viridian green (optional)

Large tube: titanium white

Matte Acrylic Medium- acrylic painters only- large 5 oz tube

Gamsol- 1pint container- oil painters only

A wide mouth glass jar with lid for transporting Gamsol. Plastic jars ok for acrylic.

Metal palette knife, trowel shaped that comes to a point- no rounded tips. About 2 inch head size.



Palette: for oil paint, no smaller than 16"x 20" (glass, plastic or disposable - no thumb hole). For acrylic paint, a plastic "cafeteria tray" and a pad of tracing paper about the size of the tray.

Brushes: sizes #2, #6, #8, #10 and #12 purchase 2 of each size. Make sure to get oil brushes for oil and acrylic brushes for acrylic. Brush shapes- flats mostly. At least 1 round. Purchase brushes with long handles only.

A 1.5-2" wide flat natural-hair brush, either a cheap one from the art supply store or, even cheaper, from the hardware/paint store.

Multiple surfaces (no smaller than 12"x16"). These can be stretched canvas, canvas boards, or canvas paper. - *You can start off with just the canvas pad and use the other surfaces weeks 3- 10* Inexpensive drawing paper pad, 16x20 or larger. Newsprint is OK. Inexpensive drawing paper pad, 16x20 or larger. Newsprint is OK.

Medium-soft vine charcoal, 1/4" round, not the tiny pieces.

Paper towel roll, disposable gloves.

Linseed oil- smallest bottle- oil painters only

Masking tape

Cloth rags – torn up old tee shirts, or sheets, etc. (so important!)

\* If you are not sure if you want to work with oil paint or acrylic, I strongly encourage starting with oils.
